

TOPIC: THE SACRAMENTS OF HEALING: ANOINTING OF THE SICK

Sacred Scripture IS 40:1-2, LK 5:17-26, JAS 5:14-15 **REFERENCES:**

CATECHISM OF THE CATHOLIC CHURCH no. 1499



Goals:

- Families will learn about: The Sacraments of Healing, particularly the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick.
- Families will reflect on the merciful healing of Jesus in Sacred Scripture.
- Families will pray a *visio divina* ("divine seeing"; praying with visual artwork), meditating on the healing of the paralyzed man.

OPENING PRAYER

Lord Jesus Christ,

We entrust our family to You and ask for Your blessing and protection. We love You Lord Jesus with all our hearts and we ask that You help our family become more like the Holy Family. ICE BREAKER

MIX AND MATCH CANDY CHALLENGE

What You Will Need: A bowl of multicolored candy (like M&Ms or skittles) and a posterboard list of challenges correlated with each color

Set-Up: First, decide what each candy color will require, for example:

- Blue candy: Sing a line from your favorite song (and see who can guess it)
- Red candy: Hop in a circle on one foot
- Orange candy: Imitate your favorite celebrity
- Green candy: Do a dance
- Purple candy: Tell a funny joke

Write these on a list (but don't show the list until after everybody has selected their candy).

How to Play:

- 1. Families sit in a circle, pass the bowl around and have each person pick a handful of candy.
- 2. Each person can eat all but one piece.
- 3. Then, go around the circle and have everyone perform the challenge associated with the selected color.





MATERIALS

- Bibles

- Crayons or colored pencils
- Mix and Match Candy Challenge Ice Breaker, bowl of multicolored candy (like M&Ms or skittles), posterboard list of challenges correlated with each color

BACKGROUND RESOURCES FOR CATECHISTS

- **CCC on the Sacrament**: Read CCC, nos. 1499-1532, for essential background on the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick.

1. Hook/Question

TEACH

2. Introduce Topic

Last month, we learned that there are two Sacraments of Healing. Sin hurts our relationship with God and some sins actually separate us from God's grace. God our Father knew that after Jesus' Death, Resurrection, and Ascension—and even after our own Baptism—we would still sin, but God loves us anyway and wants to be as close as He can be to us. So, what sacrament did He give to us to bring us closer to Him again?

Answer: The Sacrament of Reconciliation

Today we are going to learn about the other Sacrament of Healing. Do you remember what that sacrament is called?



Answer: The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick

3. CONTENT

Explain: Both of these sacraments came to us from God our Father through our Lord Jesus by the power of the Holy Spirit. During his public ministry, Jesus forgave sins and healed others. He taught His Apostles to do the same.

Watch: The Chosen scene: Jesus heals the paralytic (Luke 5:17-26) (5 min)



VISIO DIVINA

- 1. Share with families what stood out to you in the video of Jesus' healing of the paralytic man.
- 2. Invite families to share what stood out to them and why.
- 3. Ask families what their favorite story of Jesus healing someone in the Bible is.
- 4. Invite families to open their bibles, find their stories and share them with one another, explaining why the story is their favorite.

Watch: What is the Anointing of the Sick?

<u>Ask:</u> What are some of the signs of the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick that were mentioned in the video?

Answer: Blessed or consecrated oil, the Sign of the Cross, and laying on of hands (accompanied by the prayer of faith)



FAMILY ACTIVITY

Read: A Craft to Support a Lesson on the Anointing of the Sick and complete the <u>Laying on of Hands craft</u>


Healing Prayer Attributed to Padre Pio

SUPPORTING QUOTES FROM CHURCH DOCUMENTS

Catechism of the Catholic Church, no. 1499:

"By the sacred anointing of the sick and the prayer of the priests the whole Church commends those who are ill to the suffering and glorified Lord, that he may raise them up and save them. And indeed she exhorts them to contribute to the good of the People of God by freely uniting themselves to the Passion and death of Christ."

Pope Francis, General Audience (Feb. 26, 2014):

Today I would like to talk to you about the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick, which allows us to touch God's compassion for man. In the past it was called "Extreme Unction", because it was understood as a spiritual comfort in the face of imminent death. To speak instead of the "Anointing of the Sick" helps us broaden our vision to include the experience of illness and suffering, within the horizon of God's mercy.

There is a biblical icon that expresses, in all its depths, the mystery that shines through the Anointing of the Sick: it is the parable of the "Good Samaritan" contained in the Gospel of Luke (10:30-35). Each time that we celebrate this Sacrament, the Lord Jesus, in the person of the priest, comes close to the one who suffers and is seriously ill or elderly. The parable says that the Good Samaritan takes care of the suffering man by pouring oil and wine on his wounds. Oil makes us think of that which is blessed by the Bishop each year at the Holy Thursday Chrism Mass, precisely in view of the Anointing of the Sick. Wine, however, is a sign of Christ's love and grace, which flow from the gift of his life for us and are expressed in all their richness in the sacramental life of the Church. Finally, the suffering person is entrusted to an innkeeper, so that he might continue to care for him, sparing no expense. Now, who is this innkeeper? It is the Church, the Christian community — it is us — to whom each day the Lord entrusts those who are afflicted in body and spirit, so that we might lavish all of his mercy and salvation upon them without measure.
